HOT TOPIC: Shanghai Biennale

Part3 "Bodies of Water"

The Shanghai Biennale is the oldest in China and was launched in 1996. This year's 13th Shanghai Biennale "Bodies of Water" is curated by architect and writer Andrés Jaque and runs through July 25 at the Power Station of Art.

It features 76 artworks created by 64 artists and groups from 16 countries and regions, unfolding over a period of nine months to challenge the traditional format and to make up for the many months it was delayed, due to the pandemic.

Despite some reviewers criticizing the biennale as "diluted", the show includes a number of satellite events, discoverable via an app, and also introduced the work of younger, lesser known artists. Last but not least, the occurrence of the biennale should be seen as an achievement during times of Covid, albeit with some limitations.

<u>WANG GONGYI</u> <u>"Multitudes"</u> @Chambers Fine Arts <u>N</u>EW YORK Guo Hongwei's recent paintings focus on the normative yet anachronistic situations that differentiate the real world. They include, for example, a male teacher losing control of his balance bike, park-goers tossing and turning ribbons while twisting and turning their bodies, and nuns dancing with rhythmic energy.

The curators try to propose a "hypothesis" through "No Exclusivity": is the moving image the "starting point" of the work of the participating artists? Or is it possible to describe the relationship between their video and non-video practices in terms of "video in the extended field"? Are painting and sculpture also forms of the moving image?

Visions in Ballpoint Pen

Liu Yuehui (b. 1990) is a young artist, born in a village in Shandong Province and currently based in Berlin. She uses ballpoint pen almost exclusively as a medium in her works.

Since a young age, Liu developed a passion for drawing. After studying Fine Art in China, she moved to Germany, where she completed her studies. Her works are unique in that they are entirely made of ballpoint pen markings - from huge portraits to abstract color field drawings.

Growing up in a family of low income, ballpoint pen was the only medium available to the artist. Today, she continues to use the medium in memory of her childhood and in honor of her family who supported her passion. Her imaginative renderings range from large-scale mural-like formats to postcard sizes.









Jing Zhiyong 荆志勇

Jing Zhiyong (b. 1982) is a Beijing-based artist who creates surreal worlds, often depicting distant figures in strange realities. The artist uses different elements from pop culture, as well as a variety of art historical references, from René Magritte to Edward Hopper. His works are just as humorous as they are disturbing: A plane is splattered with blood as it flies by, strange meet-ups occur on the moon, a faceless man and a woman dressed in business attire kiss in a field, a man stands in the forest at night watching a burning swing...

All of Zhiyong's works seem to be part of an allusive fantasy. His titles reflect a sense of dreaminess and longing through frequent use of poetic language.




